Welcome back. It is so wonderful to see everyone back and refreshed after the Easter break. We are very excited for the term ahead, with lots of events on our calendar. I would like to take this opportunity to invite families and the community back into our classrooms, school assemblies and special events. Please remember to use the QR code whenever you visit the school and to sanitise your hands upon your arrival.

Over the holidays, Mr O'Mara undertook a lot of necessary work around the school. This meant the removal of a few trees that were deemed unsafe in our last tree audit. The silver lining is that we have been able to be a little creative and turn some of our left-over stumps into magical creations within the school. As usual Mr O'Mara has done a wonderful job and we are very lucky and grateful for his dedication. More work is still to be done and will take place next holidays to minimise disruption to student learning.

I have received an update on the progression of the Cooler Classrooms initiative that is rolling out heating and cooling units in each classroom. An audit of the school's power supply was undertaken and an electrical upgrade is required to support the increased electrical demand of Cooler Classrooms works. The work includes the installation of a new pole and pole top transformer on the corner of Grand Junction Road and Church Street. It is hoped this work will be undertaken very soon and the installation of the units can move ahead.

Last Sunday the Captains, Vice-Captains, Prefects and I attended the Yass ANZAC service. While we missed having a large number of students join us for the march, the leaders did an amazing job representing Berinba. My thanks to them and their parents for taking part.

Dear Berinba Public School Community,

I am very pleased to announce that the School Improvement Plan for 2021-2024 was finalised at the end of Term 1 and has been published to the school website. I want to thank those of you who took the time to fill in surveys and answer questions last year to help us inform the direction of our school for the next 4 years. Staff have already begun work on several of the initiatives and putting our plans into action. The plan includes the following:

#### School vision statement

In the true spirit of our motto Caring, Sharing and Achieving, Berinba is dedicated to supporting the development of students with a focus on student wellbeing, academic growth and social success. Teachers, families and students work in partnership to maintain high expectations and a positive, inclusive environment where every student is known, valued and cared for.

#### <u>Strategic Direction 1 – Student growth and attainment</u>

#### Initiative 1 – Data skills and use

The school will ensure effective strategies and processes for data analysis and reflection are used for responsive curriculum delivery.

#### Initiative 2 – Effective classroom practice

A whole school approach will ensure effective evidence informed teaching and learning, which integrates ongoing assessment and feedback with high instructional pedagogy.

#### Why are we doing this?

This is a commitment to maximising student learning outcomes in literacy and numeracy. By refining teacher practice and using data to inform 'where to next', students and teachers will continually improve every year.

#### Strategic Direction 2 – Learning Culture

#### Initiative 1 – Personalised learning

Students will experience high levels of engagement in school life by exercising their voice, choice and influence on their learning, and by working together.

#### Initiative 2 – Wellbeing processes

#### Check in assessment

Last year the NSW Department of Education developed and trialled a number of 'check-in' assessments that schools could use to help identify areas of need across literacy and numeracy. The data from these assessment was made available to teachers almost immediately and was incredibly valuable and useful. Berinba will be once again taking up the opportunity for our Year 4 and Year 6 students to take part in these assessments. These assessments are multiple choice and delivered via an electronic format. They will be undertaken in classes over the next 2 weeks. If you would like any further information about the assessments please don't hesitate to contact your child's teacher.

#### NAPLAN

Students in Years 3 & 5 will be undertaking the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). NAPLAN assessments have been scheduled for Weeks 4 & 5 this term. Berinba is moving to the online format with the majority of the assessments, except writing, to be completed digitally. A full schedule, as well as more detailed information, has been sent home to those students taking part.
