Our day began with a smoking ceremony a powerful practice of cleansing 🜿

- Traditional animal weaving led by Pitta Pitta/Wangkamahdla knowledge holders
- Spear throwing and artefact exploration shared by our Dunghutti community
- Storytelling and painting activities with community members from Ngunnawal, Wiradjuri, Wolgulu and Ngambri Country
- Food tasting shared by Kamilaroi community members a tasting of native ingredient marinated Kangaroo accompanied by a sausage sizzle by our P & C.

A heartfelt thank you to all who joined us, your generosity in sharing culture, stories and practices from the many Aboriginal communities across Australia created an unforgettable experience for our students and staff.

They provide a summary of achievement against the expected outcomes for each subject and outline areas of strength, as well as those still developing. They also reflect your child's effort, work habits, and overall engagement in their learning. These are key foundations not only for academic success but for personal growth as well.

However, as important as academic progress is, we know that school is about more than just results. It's about how students show up each day, how they treat others, how they respond to challenges, and how they grow as individuals. It's about learning how to learn, how to collaborate, how to persist, and how to contribute. These things may not always appear as a grade on a report, but they are every bit as significant.
