RSL AND SCHOOLS REMEMBER ANZAC COMMEMORATION

The RSL and Schools Remember ANZAC Commemoration was first held in 1953, co-hosted by RSL NSW and the Department of Education. Over the years the service has expanded to Catholic Schools NSW and the Association of Independent Schools NSW.

Proceedings held annually at the Anzac Memorial Hyde Park will be delivered entirely by school students including the Master of Ceremonies, keynote address, readings, and musical accompaniment. The Service also includes an Inspection of the Guard by the official party, The Ode, The Last Post, and Rouse.

The service aims to educate primary and secondary school students about Australia's military history, whilst paying respect to the service and sacrifice of servicemen and women of the Australian Defence Force.

BPS Student Representative Council - Update


Mrs Northey and Mrs Elvin are excited to announce that our 2025 Student Representative Council (SRC) is now up and running.

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Kindergarten Connects with Culture through Virtual Art Experience

Kindergarten students at Berinba recently embarked on a rich cultural and artistic journey — all from the comfort of their classroom! Thanks to a special virtual excursion to the National Portrait Gallery, our youngest learners were treated to an interactive 45-minute session guided by renowned educator and media personality Shelley Ware, alongside a Gallery educator.

The session celebrated this year's NAIDOC Week theme: The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy. Through a carefully curated selection of portraits, Shelley Ware — a proud Yankunytjatjara, Kokatha and Wirangu woman — shared stories, reflections and creative activities designed to deepen students' understanding of First Nations cultures and histories.

Ware's passion for storytelling and education shone throughout the session, as she helped our students connect with portraits of inspiring Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, while encouraging them to think, move, draw and respond with creativity and empathy.

The first portrait students explored was Lowitja O'Donoghue (2006) by Robert Hannaford AM. As they examined the strength captured in the image, students were asked to show — using just their bodies — how they would represent strength. It was a powerful moment of physical storytelling and connection.

Next, students viewed Ngalim-Ngalimbooroo Ngagenbye (2018) by Shirley Purdie, a stunning depiction of place and Country. Inspired by this work, the children reflected on their own favourite local places and created drawings to represent these special connections — from rivers and hills to backyards and playgrounds.

The session concluded with a look at Albert and Vincent (2024) by acclaimed artist Vincent Namatjira OAM. Here, students were invited to explore artistic techniques, noticing the colours, brushstrokes and styles used in the portrait. They discussed what they saw and how it made them feel — an impressive show of art appreciation from our youngest learners.

Shelley Ware, well known for her work on The Marngrook Footy Show, The Outer Sanctum podcast, and Broad Radio, brought a unique blend of cultural knowledge, teaching experience, and engaging storytelling. Her dedication to embedding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives into classrooms was truly inspiring for both students and teachers.

This virtual experience was not only a wonderful celebration of art, culture and identity, but it also encouraged meaningful conversations and sparked a curiosity that extended beyond the classroom. Many students even mentioned that they'd love to visit the National Portrait Gallery during the upcoming school holidays — a perfect way to continue learning as a family.

National Reconciliation Week 2025 at Berinba: Bridging Now to Next

Berinba was a hive of activity and deep thinking during National Reconciliation Week 2025, as students and staff embraced the theme *Bridging Now to Next* through a school-wide inquiry-based learning approach. With curiosity and respect, each classroom explored the meaning of reconciliation and why it is essential to acknowledge our shared history and take steps towards a more unified future.

Throughout the week, teachers became co-learners, walking alongside students on a journey to better understand Australia's past and its ongoing commitment to healing. We discovered that although many of us were not responsible for historical injustices, it is still vital to recognise them, reflect, and act to build respectful relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Students examined key moments in Australia's reconciliation journey, including National Sorry Day, the 2000 Sydney Harbour Bridge Walk for Reconciliation, the Uluru Statement from the Heart, and the Voice to Parliament campaign. These significant events provided powerful insights into the importance of truth-telling, unity, and forward movement.

In Kindergarten, students engaged with the beautiful book *Stories for Simon* and created their own story stones. Each stone shared a promise — a small, thoughtful act each child could take to contribute to reconciliation.

A highlight of the week was our Voice for Reconciliation performance by the SPEC Choir, who moved the school community with their rendition of *Solid Rock* by Goanna. Students then reflected on music as a powerful tool for healing. They listened to songs about reconciliation and responded through expressive drawing, capturing emotions and stories evoked by the music.

Classes also delved into artworks depicting reconciliation and healing journeys. Using the "I see, I think, I feel" model, students explored symbolism, colours, and stories behind the works, including the poster art of Bree Buttenshaw from Quandamooka Country. Inspired by these artworks, students created their own visual representations of healing — whether from personal experiences or as reflections on their learning during the week.

To showcase their commitment, each class designed a poster pledging their ongoing support for reconciliation. On Friday, our Berinba Reconciliation Walk, led by the Year 5/6 students, brought the school together as each class visited others to view and appreciate these meaningful displays.

Here's what some of our senior students from 5/6H had to say about the week:


- "I liked learning about all Australians coming together and saying sorry for taking over Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander lands and treating people differently."
- "It taught us to be less judgemental and more understanding of differences."
- "It's about trying to right the wrongs of the past as a country."
- "I'll always remember that we are on Aboriginal land."
- "The walk on Sydney Harbour Bridge showed the power of unity."


And reflections on the Berinba Reconciliation Walk:
